



This leaflet outlines this church's attitude to Baptism and provides some guidance as to who it is for.

The church's statement of faith includes the following statement – "We believe in: Communion and baptising believers as two acts of prime importance in the Church because they were expressly commanded by Jesus."

- We carry out baptism by immersion for people who are believers in Jesus, as was the practice of the early church up to the time of Constantine.
- A person is baptised on the basis of their profession of faith in Jesus Christ. It is a public witness to a personal faith in Jesus as Lord and Saviour.
- Baptism speaks of us having been made one with Christ in his death and resurrection.
- In Baptism we use the Trinitarian formula; we baptise in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, three persons who together are one God.
- Baptism is a symbol, of "dying" to our old way of life and "rising" as a new creation in Jesus, but it is not just a symbol. If we engage with it sincerely, it is an act of obedience and faith through which we encounter God and receive more of his grace and power in our lives.
- Baptism also signifies inclusion in the church family / community.



## Who is Baptism for?

- Baptism is for a Christian believer, a person who has already come to faith in Christ. Baptism does not make you a Christian.
- It is not easy to set a minimum age, but a person does need to be old enough to profess sincerely their faith in Christ and to understand what they are entering into — A lifelong commitment to Christ.

As a guide it would be exceptional for us to agree to baptise someone of primary school age.

- The decision to baptise someone requires agreement from
  - The person being baptised
  - If under the age of 18, their parent / guardian
  - The person conducting the baptism on behalf of the church.
- Although we believe baptism is important, it is not a condition of church membership or of receiving communion.
